

The Loose Moon

"Look," said Nooni. "A balloon!"




"No, it's the moon," said June.

Reading SMS messages from a cellphone

Reading activity for practicing the long oo sound (as in moon)

You can read it as a dialog with your learner, then reverse roles so they have a chance to read the other part.
